Monthly Meeting Monday, Oct. 11, 8pm at the Community House

Local Development News

Clarendon Baptist Church Affordable Housing The Planning Commission will next hear this issue on Oct. 20 or 21, and the County Board on Oct. 23. Please turn out to make your voice heard. This project proposes a high-rise tower to replace the current church at Highland and Hartford streets to include condos, affordable housing and a new sanctuary for the church. This project exceeds the height and density for a site adjacent to a residential neighborhood and if approved will set a precedent. Lyon Village and nearby civic associations, are in favor of the affordable housing, but oppose the current height and density of the proposed tower. 20% Reduction in Lot Coverage Being Considered A proposal to reduce the current allowable lot coverage of 56% will be considered by the County Board in December. For R-5 and R-6 zoned property, such as Lyon Village, it looks like coverage will be reduced to 45%. Most homes in Lyon Village are zoned R-6, minimum lot size of 6,000 square feet, though some are larger and a few may be smaller. It expected that some properties will become "non-conforming" if lot coverage is decreased. This will depend on what counts as "coverage."

As of this writing, staff has not finalized the list of what counts as coverage besides the footprint of the home. A proposal rejected three years ago by the Civic Federation also included garages, accessory structures and sheds (with and without foundations), paved and unpaved driveways and parking pads, pergolas with paved floors, bay windows with floor space, in-ground swimming pools, and covered porches. CERT Presentation at September General LVCA Meeting

Tom Panther from the county's Community Emergency Response Team provided us with great a presentation on what we can do to be ready in an emergency, complete with information on his work in Florida this summer. He noted that Lyon Village is a strong neighborhood in that we have a good distribution system (through our terrific Bulletin deliverers) and have good connections with our neighbors (referred to as a horizontal connection) and the county (a vertical connection). Frances Scott Key school is prepared to serve as an Emergency Center in case of need.

Recent tornados and hurricanes, have clearly demonstrated the need for disaster game plans. These are more than fire escape floor plans and phone trees. They are a series of tasks that need to be carried out by the family team. To be prepared, make sure you everyone in your home knows how to call 911, what radio station to tune to, have plans for fire, tornado, hurricane, power loss and health emergencies. Homeland Security starts in your home. Plan, Practice and be Prepared.

Harris Teeter at Lyon Village?

Arlington Parks – An Investment Worth Making

This November, Arlington voters have the opportunity to approve a \$75 million referendum to develop and enhance Arlington's park and recreation facilities. This year's park bond issue authorizes \$50 million to create a major new Arlington park and recreational facility at the North Tract. The remaining \$25 million provides funds to redevelop and improve existing parks and recreational facilities throughout the county.

The Master Plan for North Tract includes a state-of-the-art aquatics center and fitness space; a multi-activity center (includes courts for basketball, volleyball and other sports, an indoor running track and racquet courts); four synthetic grass athletic fields; trails, playgrounds, and gathering places; a bicycle route connecting to the Mt. Vernon Trail; and a pedestrian bridge across the railroad tracks to Roaches Run. Portions of the new park are expected to open by summer 2007.
