The Wild New Neighbors

As was mentioned in the July/August LV Bulletin, there are more of nature's creatures moving into our neighborhood. In addition to squirrels, raccoons, deer and other fairly benign creatures, we now can add to the list foxes and coyotes. People ask, are these animals dangerous? The answer can be "yes," to some degree. Keep in mind though, these animals want to be left alone even more than we do.

When asked about the situation, the County suggestion is to learn to live with it. Any threat is very minor, and the animals are moving in and acclimating mainly due to the heavy development in Fairfax and Loudon. It's a trend that is occurring all over the nation. Animals are learning to urbanize and city/suburb areas have proved to be a very successful habitat for coyotes and foxes in particular. Subsequently, they've lost a lot of their fear. Some foxes can even become friendly and somewhat tame. People should not be fooled though. These are wild animals. Leave them alone and all should be fine. Do consider keeping small pets indoors at night for their safety. If you're on the lookout, dawn and dusk seem to be the best time for spotting animals on the move.

The Rain Garden seminar will take place Saturday, Sept 16, rain or shine from 9am - noon. Registration and refreshments begin at 8:30 am at The Atrium at Meadowlark Gardens, 9750 Meadowlark Gardens Court, Vienna, VA (<http://www.nvrpa.org/meadowlark.html>).

Salvage Day Success

The Lyon Village Neighborhood Salvage Day in July was a big success. On that day, we had 41 families come through the home that stood at 1839 N Herndon Street, and they were able to salvage many items before the house was removed the following week. There will be two new brick colonials constructed on the lot. The family that has purchased one of the new homes actually was able to salvage the house numbers off the old house for reuse on their new home (their address number will be the same). They currently live in Lyon Village on N Highland and are very excited to be staying in the neighborhood while acquiring a home that meets their current needs.

It was a very busy day and many interesting items were acquired for free by Lyon Villagers. The only hitch was that all claimed items had to be removed from the premises by 5pm with no exceptions! Some folks arrived with work crews in order to remove larger items like the entire front portico for reuse at another home. Other items saved included all the original hinged exterior shutters, the fireplace mantles, built-in bookcases, a built-in china cabinet and even a built-in ironing board. Other popular finds were chair rail and base moldings that were a perfect match for some other older LV homes, stair treads, oak flooring, interior and exterior doors, hardware, plants from the garden, flagstones and lighting fixtures.

We owe many thanks to Brian Normile of BCN Enterprises for the opportunity to save so many beautiful items. This is also a good opportunity to remind folks that if you encounter any construction related problems due to new homes being built nearby, please contact Lyon Village President Mark Weinress prior to contacting the County. We're trying to tabulate issues encountered and to work with builders in our neighborhood to create the smoothest possible process as we encounter the sometimes difficult change and growth.

Thanks go out to all those who made this event a success and to Martha Moore and Mark Weinress for organizing the event. We hope to repeat the success of this Salvage Day in the future if other homes in the neighborhood sold for redevelopment.

Arlington Real-Estate

We've all been hearing about the weak real-estate market and wondering how weak is it? Arlington County is still considered a seller's market, which is good if you're marketing your home, not so good if you're looking to buy. However, if you are looking for a new home, inventories are high so there is a lot to choose from, and there is more room for price negotiation and even incentives.

One factor that is helping the Arlington market is job growth. In the first two months of the second quarter of this year, 1,563 jobs were added to the payrolls of county businesses. This helps to keep up demand for housing, if the new workers can afford to buy in Arlington. Affordability continues to be a big issue here.

The average price of a home in Arlington in the second quarter of this year was \$592,700. The forecast is for prices to continue upward. In the quarter there were 1,732 homes on the market and 806 sold. A total of 67 new homes were completed, bringing the total of new homes for the year to 90. The average number of days for a home was on the market was about 32.

In zip code 22201, encompassing most of our area, the average price for a home was \$613,600 with 161 homes sold. *Info courtesy Long & Foster.*
