LV Lights Up for Safety

In response to recent violent crime that has occurred at night, LVCA submitted to the County a comprehensive list of about 90 problem streetlights that need repair. The County has been very responsive and has already commenced work. In addition, volunteers have completed distributing 900 free fluorescent light bulbs to every home so that every resident can keep their porchlight on all night (average cost is 70 cents/month on your utility bill). Please encourage your neighbors to use them since we all benefit from brighter streets and sidewalks. You can buy more at major hardware stores for about \$2 each.

Update on Dominion Power Undergrounding Project in Clarendon

Many of you have noticed the trenching project going on in Clarendon along Hartford, Highland and Wilson Blvd to underground Dominion Power utility lines. The project has made the area very difficult to navigate either on foot or in a car. We have asked Arlington County Staff to give us an update on when the project will be completed and assurances that the street will be immediately returned to a good state of repair.

New Ways to Secure Your Property

There have been home security advancements since many of us bought our homes. The main part of the meeting will feature a panel of Lyon Village residents and Lt. Heather Hurlock from the Arlington County Police Department sharing their knowledge on this important subject. Some things they'll cover are: the pros and cons of security systems, new lock technologies, lighting, and video systems. This should be a great way to get practical advice without a sales pitch. Lt. Hurlock is available to do individual home inspections where she looks for ways to improve the security of County homes.

NCAC Projects

Also at our April 12 meeting, we will be considering a proposed project for Lyon Village under the Neighborhood Conservation Advisory Committee process. To enhance night time safety on our streets, the proposal is to fund street lights throughout Lyon Village on current telephone poles without lights and to install street lights on streets that currently do not have any. NCAC projects are funded out of the capital budget, supported by bonds.

Free Trees! Deadline April 28th

It is said that the best time to plant a tree is 20 years ago, but that the second best time is NOW! This has never been truer since Lyon Village has lost so many of our wonderful large canopy trees due to infill and the recent snow and wind storms. We need to continually plant the new trees that will eventually provide cooling shade, clean the air, reduce noise, shelter birds, and absorb storm water runoff for years to come.

To encourage renewal of the tree canopy, Arlington County is this year offering a variety of tree whips for residents FREE OF CHARGE. The tree whips are approximately three to five feet in height and are potted in two-gallon containers. The deadline for requesting trees, one per household, is April 28. There are a variety of large shade trees are being offered: American Sycamore (*Platanus occidentalis*), Swamp White Oak (*Quercus bicolor*), River Birch (*Betula nigra*). A smaller tree, the Sweetbay Magnolia (*Magnolia virginiana*) can be planted closer to overhead wires.

Political Issue Signs on Residential Property

There was confusion last week about whether political issue signs on residential property related to *The Views* project are allowed under the County's sign ordinance. A County staff person sent letters to several residents asking that they remove their signs. Subsequently a more senior County staff person was contacted and staff agreed that the signs on private property may remain in place.

We have asked County staff for clarification about what restrictions, if any, apply to political signs on private property. Please be aware that there are significant restrictions that apply to political signs placed on public property. You should also note that in most cases, the planting strip between the sidewalk and curb is public property.

Understanding the Mysteries of a Teenagers Brain

Film and More at Arlington Central Library

There are a number of exciting events coming up at the Arlington Central Library at 1015 N Quincy Street.

Thursday, April 15, 6:30pm. The Cross Cultural Cinema series presents "Storm", co-written and directed by Hans-Christian Schmid. In this German legal thriller, Hannah Maynard, prosecutor at the Hague, is leading a trial against a former commander of the Yugoslavian National Army who is accused of the deportation and killing of dozens of Bosnian-Muslim civilians. When a key witness commits suicide, it looks like the case will unravel, but Hannah refuses to give in.

Saturday, April 17, 2pm. A work-in-progress screening of "A Community of Gardeners," produced by local filmmaker Cintia Cabib. The documentary explores the vital role of seven community gardens in Washington, D.C., not only as sources of fresh, nutritious food, but as outdoor classrooms, places of healing, centers of social interaction, and oases of beauty and calm in inner-city neighborhoods. The screening will be followed by a Q-and-A with Cabib.

Monday, April 19, 7pm. A community discussion of the Arlington Reads 2010 featured title, "The Memory of Old Jack," a classic novel that sees truth and integrity in the land through the eyes of an aging farmer in 1952 rural Kentucky. Moderator: Professor Patrick J. Deneen, Georgetown University.

Thursday, April 29, 7 pm. Novella Carpenter read from and discusses her novel "Farm City: The Education of An Urban Farmer". The author has restaged the American agrarian dream in an abandoned Oakland, California lot, raising fruits, vegetables, bees and even pigs and goats. The critically acclaimed "Farm City" has been featured on best book lists from Oprah to the New York Times.

Saturday, May 1, 9:30am. Tour des Bibliothèque Bike Tour of the Libraries begins at Arlington Central Library, Quincy Street Side. Tour des Bibliothèque is a bicycle tour of six of the county's seven branches. Meet at Central Library on the Quincy Street side near the front doors. The total circular route will cover some 30 miles and take between three and four hours, but there will be several options for riding shorter portions. Tuesday, May 4, 7pm. In a rare public appearance, literary legend, essayist, poet and Kentucky farmer Wendell Berry visits Arlington Public Library to discuss his life's work and vision of people honoring and reconnecting with the soil. It was Berry who declared "eating is an agricultural act," inspiring today's movement toward safer, healthier, locally produced meals and sustainable living.
